## Guide to the Final Exam

A. <u>Key Concepts</u>: In this section of the test, you will need to identify or describe the following concepts that have been presented/discussed in class:

- B. <u>Grammar</u>. This section of the test focuses on your grammatical acumen. You need to be able to do the following:
  - a. Identify the basic Parts of Speech (noun, verb, adjective, adverb, conjunctions, prepositions, direct object, indirect object, subject, pronoun, interjections).
  - b. Identify the four types of clauses (noun, adjective, adverb, and prepositional clauses).
  - c. Identify the four types of phrases (infinitive, gerund, participle, and prepositional).
  - d. Correct a fragmented or run-on sentence.
- C. <u>Thesis Statement</u>. We have spent a significant amount of time this semester working on thesis statements. In this section of the test, you will need to:
  - a. Identify the four types of thesis statements (expository, comparative, argumentative, analytic)
  - b. Evaluate a potential thesis statement to determine its appropriateness using these criteria: focus, purpose, and structural preview.
  - c. Create a thesis statement based on a given set of information or short reading.
- D. Analysis: In this section of the test, you will be asked to perform the following types of writing analysis:
  - a. You will need to identify the structure of a paragraph using Nash's Typology of Paragraph Structure.
  - b. You will need to identify the argumentative structure of a short text (signals of reasoning, reason, supposition, intermediate conclusion, conclusion)
- E. <u>MLA Format</u>: In this section you will be asked to write three sample entries for a Works Cited page (book, academic article, web page) and two sample in-text citations (paraphrase, quotation).
- F. <u>Writing Exercise</u>: In this section of the test, you will be given a topic and asked to write either an analytical, argumentative, comparative, descriptive, or narrative paragraph. Although you will not write the actual essay, you will need to produce the following evidence: brainstorming and preliminary organization (one sentence per tier outline), and a thesis statement (narrowed topic, problem, cue/framework/map).
